From the Chamber

Reflecting on our 2024-2025 Chamber year, we are pleased to share significant progress that has benefited our members and the Columbus community. This past year was marked by substantial growth and impactful initiatives. One major achievement was the expansion of our housing development efforts, as we successfully loaned out all \$2.25 million of our available Rural Workforce Housing Funds. We also secured a \$900,000 grant from FHLBank Topeka, in partnership with Columbus Bank & Trust, to help Columbus homeowners make critical repairs to their homes—preserving them for years to come.

Additionally, we are proud to announce two new projects designed to move our community forward. The first, “Columbus on Campus”, is a partnership with Central Community College to utilize their residence halls during the summer for short-term intern housing. This initiative will help Columbus continue to attract interns and, in turn, full-time workers. Columbus on Campus will launch in the summer of 2025. The second project involves transitioning our Columbus Bucks gift certificate program to a VISA-based gift card system, which will enhance our efforts to keep as many dollars as possible circulating within the Columbus business community.

In 2024, Columbus Days celebrated its “Big 5-0!”, marking 50 years of festivities by bringing back treasured events from the past, such as bed races and a foam party. Our other ongoing programs—including the Rural Recognition Banquet, Red, White, Ka-boom!, and a variety of engaging activities—continue to enrich our community.

We extend our gratitude to our members, volunteers, and the entire community for their support throughout the year. The Columbus Area Chamber of Commerce thrived in 2024-2025, and we are excited to build on this momentum in the years ahead. We invite you to explore our achievements in our annual report and consider supporting us on this exciting journey forward.

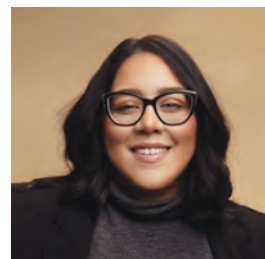

Workforce Development

Reflecting on a Year of Workforce Growth and Community Engagement

At the Columbus Area Chamber of Commerce, we are dedicated to developing workforce development and strengthening connections between students, job seekers, and local employers. Through strategic initiatives, impactful events, and dedicated partnerships, we have created opportunities that benefit both individuals and businesses in our region. As we reflect on the past year, we celebrate our successes and look forward to an exciting future.

ENGAGING STUDENTS THROUGH REAL-WORLD EXPERIENCES

This past year, our workforce development programs engaged students from Columbus Public Schools, Lakeview Community Schools, and Columbus Catholic Schools, as well as regional schools such as Boone Central, Newman Grove, Lindsey, Humphrey, Leigh, David City, Osceola, Shelby-Rising City and St. Edward. Our signature programs, including Vehicle Day, Reality 101, and Interview Day, provided invaluable hands-on experiences:

- **Vehicle Day** introduced approximately **680 first grade students** to various career pathways by showcasing vehicles used across different industries in our community.

- **Reality 101** helped over **595 junior high students** understand financial literacy and real-world decision-making.

- **Interview Day** allowed more than **370 junior and senior students** to practice professional interviewing skills with local employers.

These events would not have been possible without the support of our volunteers, who generously gave their time and expertise. Their commitment to education and career development has significantly impacted the students of our region, setting them on a path toward success.

BUILDING BRIDGES BETWEEN EMPLOYERS AND JOB SEEKERS

We play an essential role in connecting local businesses with skilled talent. Our Workforce Development Program provides several resources to employers:

- **Career Fairs:** This past year, we proudly represented our workforce investors at major college career fairs, including those at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln, Wayne State College, the University of Nebraska-Kearney, Midland University, and Northeast Community College. During these events, we collected over **180 resumes**, directly linking businesses with

potential candidates. Additionally, we engaged with over **300 individuals**, sharing insights about our workforce investors and the vital role the Chamber plays in workforce development. These career fairs have been instrumental in connecting the region's top talent with local employers.

- **Job Board:** We have reintroduced our **Chamber Job Board**, providing a streamlined platform for our members and workforce investors to post job openings and find qualified applicants.

- **Networking Events:** This past summer, we hosted a series of events for interns and young professionals, helping them build valuable connections and engage themselves in the Columbus community. From **BBQ Night** and **Taco & Game Night** to **Axe Throwing** and **Golfing with a Business Professional**, we created meaningful engagement opportunities that will have a lasting impact—reaching over 30 individuals.

EXPANDING REGIONAL WORKFORCE INITIATIVES

Our efforts extend beyond Columbus, and we are proud to develop partnerships with neighboring towns such as Albion, St. Edward, Lindsay, Humphrey, Leigh, Newman Grove. We continue

to introduce workforce development programs in these areas, ensuring that businesses have access to a broader pool of skilled workers.

**LOOKING AHEAD:
COLUMBUS ON CAMPUS**

One of our newest initiatives is Columbus on Campus, a partnership with Central Community College (CCC) that provides affordable housing for summer interns, and we're excited about the opportunities it creates. We recognize that housing can be a barrier to securing internships, so CCC will open its residential facilities to interns working in Columbus.

Interns participating in Columbus on Campus will also be required to continue their education by enrolling in credit courses or certification programs offered by CCC. This initiative not only supports young professionals but also strengthens their ties to the Columbus community, increasing the likelihood of long-term retention in the region. Columbus on Campus is an important step in positioning our community as a leader in workforce development and talent retention.

The Key to Unlocking Columbus' Potential



Our Board and Housing Committee had another busy, yet productive year working to address our housing shortage. To set the stage for how important it is to address our housing shortage, the 2021 Columbus housing study showed that we need to build 127 new units a year to keep up with our current growth. That doesn't touch our current shortage, instead we need to build 127 units a year to keep that gap from growing even larger.

Four years later, we are now making strides to add over 1,400+ units between now and 2028. These 1,400+ units are projected to help Columbus welcome nearly 3,500 new residents to the community. We are excited at the opportunities Columbus will have because of the growth of our community and its housing stock.

HOUSING REHABILITATION PROGRAM

In 2024, we were awarded \$900,000 through FHLBank Topeka’s 2024 Affordable Housing Program (AHP). This year \$31.3 million in AHP grants were made in partnership with FHLBank Topeka’s member financial institutions. The member partnering on this project is Columbus Bank & Trust Company.

The AHP grant funds our Housing Rehabilitation Program, which will provide \$900,000 to assist 60 homeowners of various income levels in making repairs to their homes to maintain the integrity of the home, while also providing them valuable homeowner education. We have created a prequalification form to identify eligible rehabilitation projects. The form can be found

RURAL WORKFORCE HOUSING FUND

In May of 2023, we received notice that our request for \$1,000,000 from the Nebraska Rural Workforce Housing Fund (RWHF) had been approved. This request was accompanied by a \$500,000 local match that was provided by the City of Columbus LB840 Economic Development Fund. In January of 2024, we received notice of award for an additional \$502,685 from the Nebraska Department of Economic Development. These funds were matched locally with \$251,343. The Chamber, the BD Foundation, and Cargill contributed to the local match.

In the past 12 months, we have been hard at work to disburse these funds to support housing projects in our community. We have since funded \$2,255,000 worth of low interest housing loans from our Rural Workforce Housing Fund to four housing projects that combined will add roughly 850 new housing units to Columbus. As these loans are repaid, new loans will be issued to continue supporting housing development in our community.

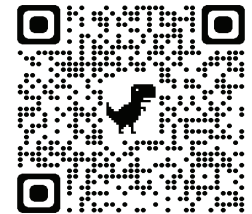
Two of the projects supported by our Rural Workforce Housing Funds have already broken ground and started construction. One project consists two two-unit townhomes that will be available for sale upon completion. The other project will consist of 240 apartment units that will be available for rent upon completion. The remaining projects that received funding will break ground in the next year.

from public, private and philanthropic groups to increase affordable housing. This partnership led to a change in Freddie Mac’s lending guidelines and create a new lending product that manufactured housing qualifies for. Chamber President Dawson Brunswick 2024-2025 Board Chair Brett Rains, and 2025-2026 Board Chair Travis Tessororf attended the trip on behalf of the Chamber. Nebraska is home to multiple modular and manufactured housing companies, and modular and manufacturing housing is currently being explored to assist in our housing strategy.

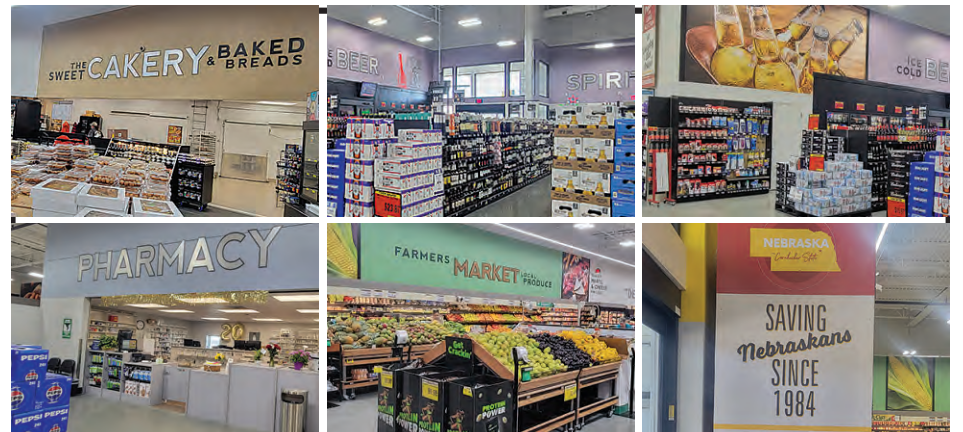
• HOLIDAY BASKETBALL TOURNAMENT (DECEMBER 28 & 30, 2024)

Advocating for Our Community

Our Board and Legislative Committee continue to advocate for pro-business policies that further enhance the Columbus area. In the past year, we have maintained our efforts to advocate for pro-business policies, continued our annual Washington, DC Fly In, and cohosted Northeast Nebraska Day at the Capitol with other Chambers across the region.

LEGISLATIVE COMMITTEE

Our Legislative Committee hosted Senator Moser to discuss the upcoming first session of the 109th Legislature. Senator Moser provided insight on the upcoming session. At the state level, we have been focused on clarifying language on the Nebraska Healthy Families and Workplaces Act to help our members clarify what changes they need to make to comply with the new law. We have also advocated for business friendly adjustments to the minimum wage legislation that passed several years ago.

NORTHEAST NEBRASKA DAY AT THE CAPITOL

We cohosted Northeast Nebraska Day at the Capitol with other Chambers from across the region. This event provides participants with the opportunity to learn about varying legisla-

tive matters and meet Nebraska Senators at an evening reception. The event also serves as the legislative portion of Leadership Columbus. Class members had lunch with Senator Moser, received an update from the Nebraska Chamber of Commerce & Industry, heard from Governor Jim Pillen, and other state officials.

WASHINGTON, D.C. FLY-IN

In March, Chamber President Dawson Brunswick and Chairman Brett Rains led a group of board members, and business and community leaders to Washington, D.C. to meet with our federal delegation. We appreciate all five members of the Nebraska Delegation for their time they spent discussing issues that matter to Columbus and Nebraska. We used our time to focus on the need to make the tax cuts from the Tax Cuts & Jobs Act permanent, work to address trade and tariffs in our current environment, and a proposal that would increase the federal funds that Columbus Community Hospital receives from Medicare. We also discussed workforce, housing, and childcare efforts in our community. While in D.C, we also met with the U.S. Chamber of Commerce, the government affairs offices of Columbus employers, and others to make the most of our time in DC.

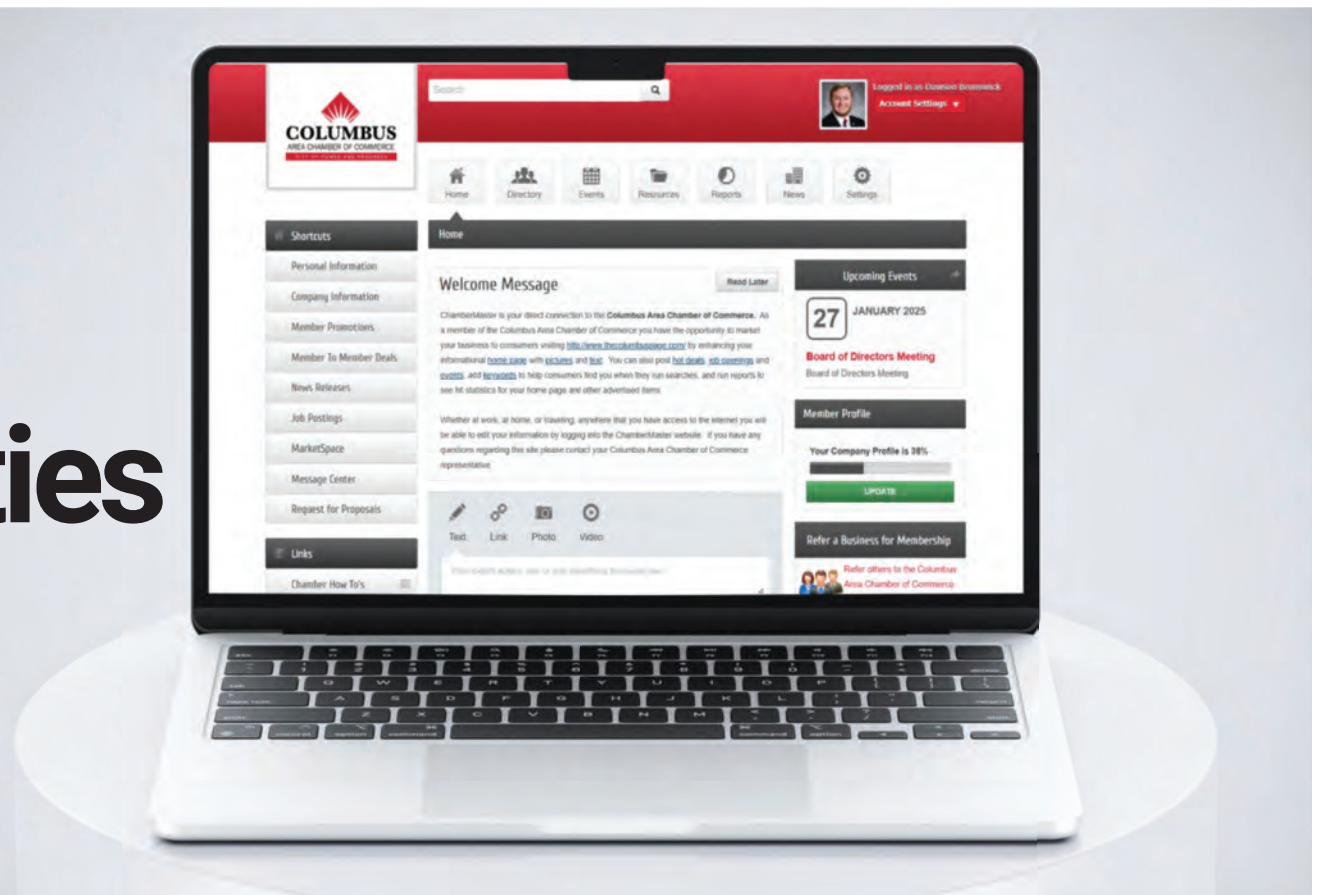

Columbus Bucks is Going Digital: A New Chapter for a Trusted Program

At the end of 2024, the Columbus Area Chamber of Commerce began exploring the future of our Columbus Bucks program. After years of successful use and strong community support, our staff and Board of Directors recognized the importance of evolving the program to keep up with today's transaction habits and consumer expectations.

Through this research, we identified an exciting new path forward—transitioning Columbus Bucks to a VISA-based card platform.

This new system will continue to keep local dollars circulating in our member businesses, while also providing valuable data on where and how Columbus Bucks are being spent. These insights will help us better understand the program's impact and how it contributes to local business growth.

Other chambers in Nebraska have already seen strong results from making the switch. Seward County and York Chambers of Commerce have adopted this card-based model with success, and the Kearney Chamber is currently in the process of transitioning as well.

We are currently in the planning and implementation phase, and the information below is intended to give you a preview of what to expect once we are ready to launch the new program.

WHY MAKE THE SWITCH?

Advantages of the New Card-Based Program:

- **Consumer-Friendly:** Just like a traditional gift card, the new Columbus Bucks card can be loaded with any amount (\$10 minimum) and used like a credit card at participating businesses.
- **Easy for Businesses:** No more handling change or waiting for reimbursements—funds are deposited electronically, just like any Visa transaction.
- **Real-Time Insights:** The Chamber will now have access to usage data—allowing us to track the reach and return of the program in a way that wasn't possible with paper checks.

HOW IT WORKS

- **Getting Set Up:** Chamber staff will assist your business in registering to accept the card using a simple link for your POS system. A merchant ID will also be available for online transactions.

We're excited about the future of Columbus Bucks and the new opportunities this platform will bring. As we continue working behind the scenes to build out this modern, flexible program, we look forward to sharing more details and rollout information later this year.

Stay tuned—there's more to come!

- **Card Purchases:** Consumers will purchase the cards through the Chamber. The cards are pre-loaded and ready to use. Cards cannot be reloaded.
- **Using the Card:** Cards are run as credit and work exactly like any Visa card. Funds are deposited into your business account automatically.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

- **What about current paper checks?**
Valid paper checks will still be honored. They do not expire.
- **Do the new cards expire?**
No
- **Can I use my own business gift card with a Chamber card?**
Yes! Split transactions are allowed.
- **What about returns?**
Refunds should not go back onto the card. We recommend offering store credit or your own business gift card.
